Trevor Beattie was born in
Balsall Heath, Birmingham
and educated at Moseley Art
School. He graduated with an
Honours Degree in Graphic
Design & Photography from
Wolverhampton Polytechnic in
1981.

## In London, Beattie began a career in advertising

This saw him create some of the most talked-about campaigns of all time. 'Hello Boys' for Wonderbra, 'FCUK' for French Connection UK and the image of William Hague with Margaret Thatcher's hair for the Labour Party saw Beattie's reputation rise in fame and notoriety. He helped mastermind the PR and advertising campaigns for New Labour's election victories in 1997, 2001 and 2005. Beattie set up his own agency BMB in 2005

He has been awarded Honorary

Doctorate of Arts Honours by both

Birmingham and Wolverhampton

Universities.

## In 2008 Trevor moved into film production

He teamed up with Duncan Jones (son of David Bowie) to produce the Bafta-winning sci-fi movie MOON in 2009. He subsequently produced movies on the life story of dancer Rudolf Nureyev, and a feature-length documentary on the Spitfire. He regularly writes for *The Guardian, Independent* and *GQ Magazine*.

In 2011, he set up The Jack And Ada Beattie Foundation (beattiefoundation.com) in honour and memory of his parents. The Foundation recently launched 'Bank of Mum and Dad', to provide interest-free loans to those falling foul of pay day loan schemes. Via the Beattie Foundation, and in conjunction with friend Eddie Izzard, he formed 'Project Overlord', an ongoing scheme to return D-Day Veterans to the beaches of Normandy. He recently purchased the first flag to be raised above Sword Beach in Normandy on 6th June 1944.

In 2016, Beattie exhibited
his extensive Collection of
Muhammad Ali memorabilia at the
O2 in London, later touring in Las
Vegas. In the same year he made a
trek with Apollo Moonwalker Buzz
Aldrin to Antarctica and the South
Pole, fulfilling his friend Buzz's
bucket list dream.

As one of the very first people to purchase a (return) ticket on Sir Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic space programme, Beattie plans to fulfil his life-long wish by becoming an astronaut.
